#### Balboa Park 31st Annual Pow Wow

Saturday, May 11 - 10:00 AM to 6:00 PM: The San Diego American Indian Health Center's (SDAIHC) Annual Balboa Park Pow Wow will take place on the southwest corner of Park Boulevard and Presidents Way. This year is SDAIHC's 40th Anniversary, which shares a story of strength and resilience within the local Native American population that will also be recognized at the 2019 Balboa Park Pow Wow.

The Pow Wow is a traditional and cultural event that showcases the heritage of American Indians. For more than 30 years, the American Indian community throughout the San Diego area has celebrated their traditions by gathering at the Balboa Park Pow Wow. The cultural event features traditional drum groups and inter-Tribal dancing. Participants of all ages will be present from various American Indian Tribes, bands and communities proudly wearing beautiful regalia. In recognition that we are all guests of San Diego's "first people," Kumeyaay singers will open the event both days with their traditional Birds Songs. Gourd Dancing will follow and then the Grand Entry, which opens a day of Inter-Tribal Dancing. Vendors will be selling handmade jewelry, pottery, basketry, clothing and a variety of other crafts and goods. Food vendors will also be selling a variety of delectable items, including fry bread and Indian tacos.

## Canyoneers Hike: Cuyamaca Rancho State Park (Juaquapin Creek Loop)

Walk along a beautiful, shaded creek and stop for lunch near an area with morteros where native people once prepared food. This is an intermediate 6 mile hike with an elevation gain/loss of up to 1000 feet. 8:30 AM–2 PM.

(Cuyamaca Rancho State Park) From I-8, exit north on to CA-79 and go 2.7 miles. Turn left to stay on CA-79 and go 4.9 miles. Turn into the large parking area on the right (0.5 mile past the Green Valley Campground). No facilities. (GPS N32.910431, W116.574175). Please leave dogs at home and come enjoy nature.

#### Canyoneers Hike: Lake Hodges (East Arm)

Hike through varied terrain, pass a waterfall, and learn about Native American use of plants in this area that is rich in Kumeyaay history. This is an easy 4 mile hike with an elevation gain/loss of up to 200 feet. 9 AM–NOON.

(Rancho Bernardo) Take I-15 to West Bernardo Dr./Pomerado Rd. and turn west. Go 0.5 mile. There is a turnoff into a dirt parking lot on the right. Meet at the signed Bernardo Bay Natural Area. No facilities. (GPS N33.054405, W117.075216) Please leave dogs at home and come enjoy nature.

## Save Our Heritage Organisation [SOHO] Terrace Talks: Why Old Places Matter

May 11, 11am-12:30pm \$10 (includes light refreshments)

Marston House Museum & Gardens (3525 Seventh Avenue, San Diego 92103)

Why Old Places Matter will be discussed by three longtime SOHO leaders informed by a recent book of the same name and subtitled "How Historic Places Affect Our Identity and Well-Being." As author Thompson M. Mayes of the National Trust for Historic Preservation notes, we may not always see past bricks, mortar, and the significant people and events they contained, but historic buildings and sites play a major role in the social, psychological, and emotional fabric of our complex culture and enrich our quality of life, as individuals and collectively.

Panelists include Jaye MacAskill, SOHO's immediate past president and a professional researcher; Dan Soderberg, maker of SOHO's award-winning documentary "Four Decades of Historic Preservation in San Diego County" and a board member; and David Swarens, also a board member who twice served as president and who helped create two large historic districts in the City of San Diego. Each speaker will illustrate the book's concepts, using examples from SOHO's preservation efforts over 50 years. The concepts include memory, continuity, beauty, ancestors, creativity, community, and sustainability. Amie Hayes, SOHO's Historic Resources Specialist, will moderate the panel.

**Title:** *Watchtowers and Computers* 

Presenter: Alberto Foglia

Alberto B. Foglia will present his Master's thesis on the possible functions of the turret structures on Hadrian's Wall. In the 2nd century, Roman Emperor Hadrian constructed a series of frontier works across northern Britain to consolidate this northern corner of the Roman Empire. However, how the frontier, and the component structures of the wall, operated is still debated. Alberto created a GIS to perform a viewshed analysis of the smallest structures on the Wall, the so-called 'turrets', to see how well they performed as watch towers.

He will also present on some work he has been doing on making 3D reconstructions of parts of Hadrian's Wall.

• May 9, 2019. Ivan Strudwick: "Anaheim's Chinatown."

What is thought to have been Orange County's largest Chinatown was established in the early 1870s near the center of Anaheim, which was originally founded as a vineyard colony by Germans in 1857. From the mid-1850s to the 1880s, one of every ten Californians was Chinese. When Anaheim was incorporated in 1876, about one-sixth of the city's population was Chinese. By 1890, 75% of California's agricultural workforce was Chinese. Anaheim's "China Town" is depicted on 1907 and 1911 Sanborn maps near what was the center of the original colony at Los Angeles and Center Streets. In 1924, this small community was demolished, ostensibly for health concerns, and the last building torn down in 1940. This report describes a few artifacts that were found when this historic area was recently graded for development.

Mr. Strudwick has conducted and managed all phases of archaeological and historic projects, including survey and excavation, laboratory analysis, research, and report writing in more than 20 California counties and on three of California's Channel Islands. For the past 25 years, Mr. Strudwick has been employed as a professional archaeologist at LSA in Irvine.

 June 13, 2019. Barbara Tejada: "Coming Home to Siutkanga: A Journey of Research and Repatriation of the Lost Village of Encino"

Coordination to reunite and bring the collection from the "Lost Village of Encino" (CA-LAN-43), excavated in 1984-85, to Los Encinos State Historic Park began in earnest in early 2013. From the first delivery in early 2015, to the final van load in fall of 2018, the collection has undergone sorting and re-housing by a team of State Park staff, volunteers, and student interns. Along the way, new information has emerged on the lithics assemblage, olivella grooved rectangular (OGR) beads and bead manufacture, the high incidence of tarring pebbles, and the burial/cremation complex. Working with the Fernandeño Tataviam Tribe, the collection has helped instruct tribal members on lithic technology, and in turn, genealogical research sponsored by the tribe has revealed more about the ethnohistory of the village. Work continues to identify NAGPRA materials in the collection for repatriation. Sorting and cataloging this

collection will enable continued research on this important Western Tongva site.

Barbara Tejada is the District Archaeologist for the California State Parks Angeles District, covering park units in Los Angeles, Ventura and Santa Barbara counties. She has over 20 years' experience in southern California archaeology. She currently is the board chair and acting director of the Chumash Indian Museum in Thousand Oaks


